Contempt and Enforcement Orders in For Divorce and Custody

When a former spouse fails to comply with a court order or the terms of a private separation agreement that has been incorporated into a court order (such as a divorce decree or custody order), the other spouse may ask the court for help in gaining compliance.

Read the Law: Md. Code, Family Law § 8-213

The court may exercise its jurisdiction over the former spouse who has not abided by the order if:

- he or she lives within the state;
- if he or she lives in a state in the United States that has a reciprocal agreement with Maryland; or,
- in the case of enforcing a monetary agreement, if he or she owns property within the state (e.g., real estate, bank accounts, a business, or stocks and bonds).

If the ex-spouse is not a resident of Maryland, the court may exercise its jurisdiction if the exspouse is served in accordance with the Maryland Rules AND:

- Maryland was the matrimonial domicile of the parties before their separation; OR
- the obligation to pay the child support, spousal support, or attorneys fees arose under Maryland laws or under an agreement executed by one of the parties in Maryland.
